These seminars will explore in part the same terrain as our Politics and Ethics seminar in Birmingham. To what extent can it be argued that the recent focus on ethics within our work marks a retreat from politics? Doesn't politics over-arch ethics? If a political regime is unjust and unequal, what price our efforts to live good lives under its banner? If youth work itself becomes authoritarian and prescriptive in its intent, what price our efforts to be ethical within its embrace? These questions have been given organisational resonance with the emergence of the Institute of Youth Work and the requirement to sign up to a code of ethics.

However we will be broadening the argument to engage with the long-running issue of politics and youth work practice. Particularly as there seems to be a revival of the view that politics has no place in the work. Indeed in a refreshing debate on the IDYW site before Christmas, questions were posed as to whether the politicised tone and language of the Campaign is alienating would-be supporters. Almost five years on from the Campaign's emergence this discussion is timely and ought to contribute to the possible need for a fresh statement of intent and purpose at our April conference.
